General Meeting, October 5, 2017

President Chris Hudson called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. at the Oakhurst Community Center, led the flag salute, and reminded everyone to silence their cell phones. Mary Boardman volunteered to be Sergeant-at-Arms. Chris thanked PJ Grant for being a greeter and thanked the October birthday ladies for refreshments. By motion of Sharon Weaver, seconded by Toni Morton, the August 3, 2017, General Meeting minutes were approved. The September general meeting was canceled due to the fires and smoke and the Community Center being used for an evacuation center.

The Treasurer's report was approved as printed in the newsletter and the report was filed for audit.

Reports:

Penni Simily/1st Vice President announced that Lyn Mann is doing a trunk show this evening on borders and a workshop on Friday on There's No Such Thing As Ugly Fabric. She presented information on the Christmas party, flyers are available and noted the 2018 program list is available. Veterans appreciation will be held in November; cuddle quilt sewing in January 2018; Mary Platz will do a workshop on Wacky Divine in February; Cathie Hoover is scheduled for the March meeting and Cindy Wiens is scheduled for the April meeting on modern quilts.

Sandy Johnson/2nd Vice President held the drawing for the September challenge/fall colors and for the October challenge/pumpkins. The November challenge for the squares will be winter blues colors. She noted that with Lissa Metzger's assistance they are looking at doing a row-by-row for next year versus the challenge squares. Patty Wiens/Library stated she has been sorting and cataloging the books, and she noted the donation of quilting magazines by Sue Muenster.

Jullie Vasquez/Membership advised that 66 members were present. The door prize drawing was held. Betsy Anne Youngholm/Cuddle Quilts noted that she has cuddle quilt kits available. The October sewing day at Bear Paw has been cancelled since they do not know the status of their move date. The next sewing day will be in November.

Sally Walker/Mystery Quilt project advised that all clues have been made available and she showed a quilt that was made by Sharon Hebbard that inspired the selection of the mystery quilt.

Chris Hudson noted the Board has agreed to pay a large portion of the Christmas dinner this year. Tickets are \$5.00 for the members.

Other Business:

Sinta Borland advised of the selection of five quilt patterns for the Guild to vote on for the opportunity quilt for the next Show. Voting will be held later in the meeting.

Sandy Johnson noted that the Board approved the American Legion Auxiliary's request for a community quilt and asked for a volunteer from a member or a circle to make the quilt. The Guild will provide reimbursement with receipts.

Rhonda Lloyd provided an update on Donna Henning; she had physical therapy today and is doing better. Bear Paw is planning to move later this month.

Chris Hudson responded to questions she received about attendance and income at the Quilt Show.

Chris Hudson noted that Toni Morton has a stitch speed regulator available for sale, and that there are free magazines and information on quilt shows on the back table. Chris recognized the presence of Sue Johnson following her hip replacement. Chris announced that the free sew day has been moved to November.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:34 p.m. with the next General Meeting to be held on November 2, 2017. Show and tell was held. Following a break, voting was held on the patterns for the opportunity quilt – Number 1/Eldon was selected; and Number 5/Everyday Best was the runner-up.

Penni Simily introduced Lyn Mann and she presented the trunk show on "Head for the Border" showing options for extending the guilt pattern into the border.

Mercerised cotton

Mercerisation is a treatment for cellulosic material, typically cotton threads, that strengthens them and gives them a lustrous appearance. The process is less frequently used for linen and hemp threads.

Development

The process was devised in 1844 by John Mercer of Great Harwood, Lancashire, England, who treated cotton fibers with

sodium hydroxide. The treatment caused the fibers to swell, which in Mercer's version of the process shrank the overall fabric size and made it stronger and easier to dye. The process did not become popular until H.A. Lowe improved it into its modern form in 1890. By holding the cotton during treatment to prevent it from shrinking, Lowe found that the fibers gained a lustrous appearance. The process was taken to the DMC company in Mulhouse, France by Jean Dollfus in the 19th century.

Thread

The modern production method for mercerised cotton, also known as "pearl" or "pearle" cotton, gives cotton thread (or cotton-covered thread with a polyester core) a sodium hydroxide bath that is then neutralized with an acid bath. This treatment increases luster, strength, affinity to dye, and resistance to mildew. On the other hand, it also increases its affinity to lint.

Cotton with long staple fiber lengths responds best to mercerisation. Mercerised thread is commonly used to produce fine crochet.

Chris's Comments...

Block of the Month

Each month a different block will be presented at the SMQA meeting along with instructions. You can participate each month or just occasionally. Bring your completed block(s) to the next meeting, and you will get a raffle ticket for each block you turn in. When all are turned in, there will be a drawing, and the winner gets ALL the blocks. You could get 10 or 20 or maybe even 40! The blocks are yours to do with as you choose. Just remember to bring back your completed project so we can see what you did with them.

Block for December Meeting: Tree

Background (light/medium/dark blue)

• • •	
3" x 3" (5)	2½" x 5½" (2)
2½" x 4½" (2)	2½" x 3½" (2)
2½" x 2½" (2)	2½" x 1½" (2)


Tree (greens)

3" x 3" (5)	2½" x	8½"	(1)
2½" x 6½" (1)	2½" x	4½"	(1)

2½" x 2½" (1)

Trunk (brown) 2½" x 2½" (1)

Make 10 HST (half square triangles) out of the 3" background and tree fabrics using your



favorite method or...layer the 3" dark (or light) blues together with your tree fabric, right sides together. Draw a diagonal line on the lightest one and sew $\frac{1}{2}$ " on each side of the line. Cut on the drawn line and press towards the darkest fabric. Square to $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Using the graphic as a reference, put the HST together with the other background and tree fabrics to form the tree.

The trunk is made using the 2½" x 5½" background fabrics on both sides of the trunk piece as shown in the graphic. Add to the tree section.

Hope to see lots of trees for our final block of the month for this year.

2017 October Show & Tell














At our October meeting, Lyn Mann explained using Spacer Borders. Here is her copyright page of the instruction she promised she would send for publication in our newsletter.

SPACER BORDER © 2000

TO MAKE YOUR PIECED BORDER FIT YOUR QUILT YOU PROBABLY WILL NEED TO ADD A SPACER BORDER. TO FIGURE THE WIDTH TO CUT THE SPACER BORDER, MEASURE THE LENGTH OF THE PIECED BORDER AT THE EDGE THAT ATTACHES TO THE QUILT. THEN MEASURE THE LENGTH OF YOUR QUILT DOWN THE CENTER. SUBTRACT THE QUILT FROM THE BORDER AND DIVIDE BY 2 (YOU HAVE TO SPLIT THE AMOUNT BETWEEN THE TWO SIDES.) THEN ADD 1/2" FOR SEAM ALLOWANCES AND THIS IS THE WIDTH YOU CUT THAT SPACER BORDER. IF YOUR QUILT IS SQUARE, THE SPACER BORDER WILL BE THE SAME FOR ALL FOUR SIDES. HOWEVER, IF YOUR QUILT IS RECTANGULAR, YOU MAY HAVE A DIFFERENT WIDTH SPACER BORDER FOR THE SIDES (LENGTH) THEN FOR THE TOP AND BOTTOM (WIDTH). SO YOU WILL NEED TO MEASURE BOTH LENGTH AND WIDTH AND MAKE TWO CALCULATIONS AS ABOVE. THE BORDER WIDTH THAT YOU ARRRIVED AT FOR THE TOP AND BOTTOM IS THE WIDTH YOU CUT THE SIDES BORDERS. AND IN TURN, THE MEASUREMENTS FOR THE SIDES GO ON THE TOP AND BOTTOM. REMEMBER YOU MUST ALSO DETERMINE HOW LONG TO CUT THESE BORDERS AND MATCH YOUR QUILT AND BORDER AT FIRST AND THIRD QUARTERS AND IN THE MIDDLE AND SEW WITH THE QUILT TO THE FEED DOGS.
