Her workshop showing us how to make the Boomerang quilt by Jaybird Quilts will be on Friday, September 7. A sample of the quilt and pattern was shown at our last meeting. Sierra Mountain Quilters Association August 2, 2018 General Meeting Minutes

President Rhonda Lloyd called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and led the flag salute. She expressed appreciation for the evening's greeters, Lynn Gray and Carolin Gaither, and recognized Sharon Weaver for the refreshment table set up. Rhonda thanked the August birthday ladies for the refreshments and, since the SMQA provided the refreshments for the June and July meetings, asked the birthday ladies for those months to bring cookies to the December meeting.

Nancy Swanson made a motion to accept the July General Meeting Minutes as published in the newsletter. Bev Spears seconded the motion. Minutes for July were approved by the membership. There were no questions or corrections to the Treasurer's report as printed in the July newsletter. The Treasurer's report was therefore filed for audit as submitted.

Rhonda Lloyd announced various upcoming quilt shows and classes to be held at Bear paw over the next few months. Rhonda also noted that Bear Paw will have its anniversary sale on August 4^{th.} We plan to have the Opportunity Quilt and raffle tickets there. Bear Paw has two classes coming up in July and August, taught by Mary Brand: how to make quilts with your serger and machine quilting with rulers.

Helen Brown reported for Membership and the Door Prize drawing was held.

Betsy Anne Youngholm reported that 99 cuddle quilts have been distributed to date. She also announced that the Fall Retreat participation was full. She suggested that new members and those who have not attended a retreat before stop by at ECCO in September to visit and see what we do at retreats.

First Vice President Penni Simily announced the upcoming programs, with Cathie Hoover as our August presenter and her "Wild and Crazy" workshop on Friday, and Lisa McKissick with the September presentation and workshop. In October, SMQA will provide free motion quilting demonstrations by SMQA members.

Second Vice President Sandy Johnson introduced the next row of blocks for the Row Quilt pattern for this year's voluntary members' quilt pattern and reminded members that the patterns and directions are on the SMQA website.

Sally Walker distributed the next clue for this year's Mystery Quilt and noted that the final clue will be in September.

Rhonda Lloyd announced that Betsy Blum, Lynn Gray, and Sharon Weaver have volunteered for the Nominating Committee for next year's Board. President Rhonda Lloyd, First Vice President Penni Simily, and Second Vice President Sandy Johnson will be stepping down. Betsy Blum addressed the membership regarding the Board positions and requirements. She noted that the Nominating Committee will be contacting members to fill the 2019 SMQA Board.

For the 2019 Quilt Show Committee, Sinta Borland demonstrated a unique way to raffle off fat quarters (a clear cake container filled with "slices" of fabric) and solicited fat quarters from members. Chris Hartesveldt noted that although we have been accepted to show the Opportunity Quilt at the PIQF quilt show October 11 through 14, we will need to provide 32 volunteer hours of white gloving during the show (preferably on Friday, the 12th). We will also need volunteers to sit with the quilt on those days. Volunteers were also requested to sign up to sit with the Opportunity Quilt and sell raffle tickets at Dorsey's Hallmark, Bear Paw, and True Value in the next few months.

The business meeting was adjourned at 6:35 p.m. and was followed by Show and Tell and the evening's program of Cathie Hoover's quilts and wearables.

The next SMQA General Meeting is scheduled for September 6th at 6:00 p.m. Doors open at 5:30 p.m.

Quilt History

Quilt making was common in the late 17th century and early years of the 18th. Most women were busy spinning, weaving and sewing in order to clothe their family. Commercial blankets or woven coverlets



were a more economical bedcovering for most people. Only the wealthy had the leisure time for quilt making so Colonial quilting was done by only a few

Obviously, quilts were not made of left over scraps or worn clothing as a humble bedcovering during this period. Instead they were decorative items that displayed the fine needlework of the maker such as the Baltimore album quilts.

Whole cloth quilts, broderie perse and medallion quilts were the styles of quilts made during the early 19th century.

According to the Wall Street Journal there are an estimated twenty-one million quilters in the United States.

Wholecloth quilts

Early wholecloth bed quilts which may appear to be a solid piece of fabric are composed of strips of fabric, because early looms could not produce expansion of cloth large enough to cover an entire bed surface. Early quilts that feature the same fabric for the entire quilt top, whether that top is made of dyed wool or pieces of (the same) printed cotton fabric, are referred to as wholecloth guilts. Early wholecloth quilts have three layers: a quilt top, a filling (in early guilts the filler was often wool), and a backing. The three layers are held together via quilting stitches worked by hand, in an age before sewing machines were marketed. In wholecloth quilts, the quilting stitches themselves serve as the only decoration. The earliest whole cloth quilts found in America were brought from Europe. Initially, quilts were owned by the wealthy in America who had the means to purchase imported quilts.
